# Saint Paul's Transformation from Persecutor to Preacher

- Began as a zealous Pharisee and persecutor of Christians.
- The Damascus Road Conversion
   "Then he fell to the ground and heard
   a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul,
   why are you persecuting Me?'"

Acts 9:4

- A new calling (Saul becomes Paul): becomes a passionate defender & preacher of the faith,
  - taking extensive missionary journeys
  - and authoring numerous epistles, rich with theological wisdom.

### Ready for Departure


"For I am already being poured out as a drink offering, and the time of my departure is at hand." 2 Timothy 4:6

## Philippian Church

#### **AD 50-51**

- Saint Paul founded the church in Philippi during his 2<sup>nd</sup> missionary journey (Acts 16:11-40)
- This was the first church established in Europe

#### AD 57-58

 Saint Paul made two brief visits to Philippi during his 3<sup>rd</sup> missionary journey (Acts 20:1,6)

#### AD 61-63

- Saint Paul wrote Philippians from Rome while he was under house arrest (Acts 28:16-31)
- He was free to receive visitors & write letters at that time

## Philippi

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# Background

- Philippi was noted for its generosity in support of the apostolic ministry (1:5, 4:15, 16; Acts 16:15, 40)
- It had sent Epaphroditus to visit Saint Paul in prison with a financial gift and instructions to stay with Paul
- Epaphroditus was so devoted to his work that he neglected his own physical health (2:30) and was sick
- The Philippian church was worried about Epaphroditus
- In the meantime, Paul's trial had started (1:7) and he was hoping for an early release (1:25; 2:24) from prison
- Saint Paul wrote this letter of thanks to Philippi with comforting words, and sending Epaphroditus home (2:25-30) and also sending Timothy to Philippi (2:19)

### Rejoice in the Lord!

 Philippians is one of Paul's four prison epistles (Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, Philemon)

 Despite Paul writing from prison, a central theme is to always "Rejoice in the Lord"

 Saint Paul writes to thanks the Philippian church for their support, and to comfort them about his imprisonment.

### Let's read Philippians chapter 1



## Greetings & Thanksgiving Philippians 1:1-11

- Saint Paul includes Timothy and addresses the letter to the bishops & deacons—this is the only letter where he specifically includes the clergy
- Expresses deep joy for the Philippians because it is their **fellowship** (Greek *koinonia* κοινωνία) in worship & community of life that made their spiritual father joyful
- Saint Paul prays that their love may abound in knowledge and discernment, that they approve the things that are excellent, be sincere and without offense till Christ returns, and be filled with the fruit of righteousness

## Paul's Imprisonment Advances the Gospel Philippians 1:12-26

#### Paul's imprisonment

- Helped to further spread the gospel, with everyone in the palace knowing that his chains are because of the Gospel.
- This made other believers more courageous to preach.

#### **Different Motivations for Preaching**

- Some preached from goodwill, love, and sincerity;
- Others preached out of evil motives (envy, strife, selfambition, to add more afflictions to his chains).
- Paul rejoiced regardless because Christ was proclaimed!

#### **Paul's Philosophy**

"To live is Christ and to die is gain"— joyful in either case.

## Steadfastness in Suffering Philippians 1:27-30


Paul calls believers to behave worthy of the gospel through **unity** (one mind and one spirit), striving for the **faith**, and not being terrified but **confident**.

#### The Gift of Suffering

The believer is granted <u>both</u> to believe <u>and</u> to suffer, as suffering is ...

- the way to glory,
- increases our faith,
- and is participation in God's grace.





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
